### **Chief Professionalist calls for less blame shifting and more listening**

Australia's professional community has called for a reset in the face of a concerning trend in public statements undermining confidence in Australia's leading vaccination and health advice.

Australia's expert community takes its role to provide evidence-based, expert opinion very seriously.

Australia's inaugural Chief Professionalist Professor Deen Sanders OAM said: "*Whether it's a medical diagnosis, a legal opinion, a building design or advice about vaccine efficacy, professionals will always be driven by the needs of their patient or client and how their advice provides that person with the best benefit (or safety) for them.*"

*"Seeking balance between that and wholesale public policy is the domain expertise of government in a civil democratic system. We recognise the significance of that challenge and respect those whose job it is make those decisions. We encourage the same respect in exchange."*

In our view, a principal duty governments have is to build confidence and strengthen community resilience. In particular when confronted with challenges and fears, we are all called to be at our best.

*"We are therefore concerned that the current tone of debate undermines that confidence, and that this may have larger and long-term consequences for our nation's capacity to respond to change and future crises."* Professor Sanders said.

The latest example of concern comes from statements surrounding vaccine efficacy and lockdown strategies. Australia's expert-led response to the COVID-19 pandemic is something to be very proud of but it is important to recognise that on the particular topics of individual vaccines or differing lockdown strategies, expert advice is likely to differ as they consider a risk-based matrix of impacts at either an individual patient level or lockdown strategies at a regional level. The personal, social and/or economic impact of that advice should always be a matter for political leaders, acting on the full range of expertise relevant to their public policy needs. Right now, the needs of our shared community and families demand more of us as experts, as professionals and as civil leaders.

Professor Sanders encourages all Australians to trust the advice of their professional advisors. *"Your experts have trained long and hard to provide you with the best advice for your circumstances. Listen also to the advice of your governments. When governments and professionals respect each other's role, the community can be confident that we're all in this together."*
